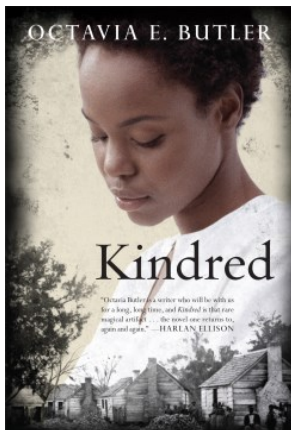




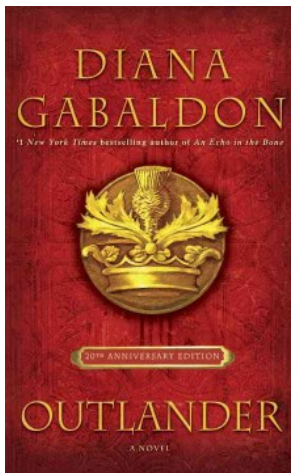

by Octavia E. Butler

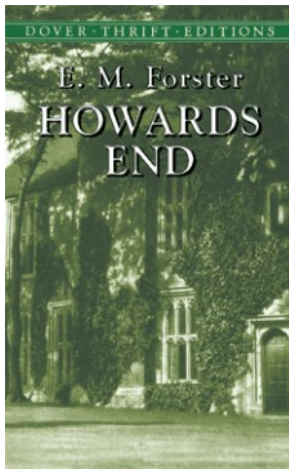

by Diana Gabaldon

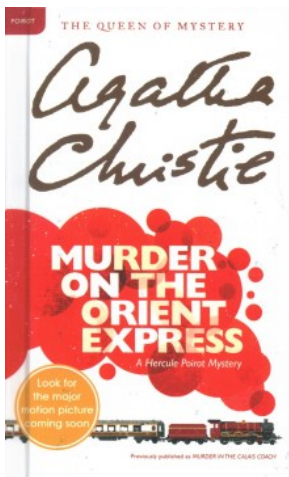

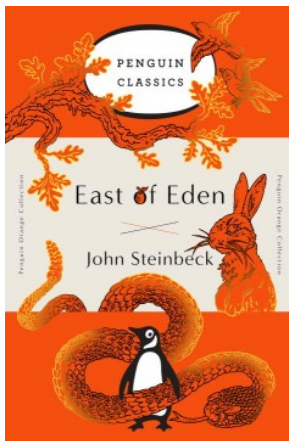

by Agatha Christie

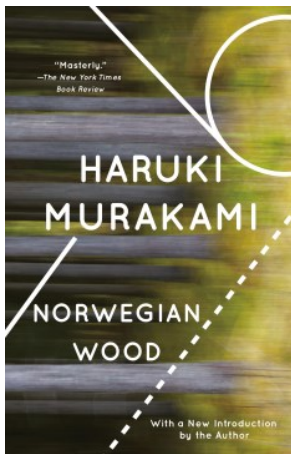
